








Randolph High School was granted a charter by the State of Ohio in 1903. The first school building was in what is now known as the Tietzman building. Growth continued for Randolph schools and the Tietzman building could no longer accommodate the growing school population. In 1924 a new Randolph High School building was completed to take care of the growing number of students. The new Northmont High School opened in the fall of 1959, and the old Randolph High School became the new junior high school. The building is now the O.R. Edgington Elementary School.



Phillipsburg High School was organized in 1906 with classes held in the township hall. In 1919 land from Montgomery, Darke, and Miami counties became the Phillipsburg Consolidated School District. A new building was built and served Phillipsburg until the new Northmont High School opened in 1959. The existing building is now Phillipsburg Elementary School.



Established August 11, 2002

Being named to the Northmont Athletic Hall of Fame is the highest honor that can be awarded to former athletes, coaches, administrators, or boosters by the Northmont Athletic Department.

The purpose of the Hall of Fame is to honor individuals who have made lasting and significant contributions to the Northmont Athletic Department and perpetuated the spirit of pride and loyalty that is a cornerstone of the Northmont community.

Candidates' qualifications must possess the following criteria: 1) Student/Athletes of Phillipsburg, Randolph, or Northmont High Schools, 2) Nominees must have distinguished themselves as a member of the Northmont coaching staff, 3) nominees must have distinguished themselves in the area of administration, or 4) nominees are a dedicated fan of the Northmont athletic program. All candidates must have been out of school for at least 10 years.

The volunteer selection committee makes nominations and considers those received from alumni and the community. Members can nominate anyone from any era. Nominations must be submitted by March 1 of the preceding year. Nominations are researched and discussed, and a final list of candidates is then presented along with the detailed biography. Post high school athletic achievement, be it college, pro, or amateur, is not a consideration.

The committee sets no quotas by sex, sport, school, or era. Members are unbiased and fair-minded. Also, the committee is sworn to strict confidentiality of all discussions resulting from this process so as to protect the candidates and maintain the highest standard of integrity.

The Hall of Fame Committee accepts nominations at anytime. Nominators should provide as much detail as possible as to why they believe the candidate is worthy of induction. Nomination does not assure induction, only consideration. All nominations are archived and discussed with diligence. It is also recognized that a process such as this is not perfect. Given the number of schools, years, and candidates, it is possible a worthy candidate could be overlooked. This is why community and alumni nominations are highly encouraged.

organ was the quintessential "Friend of Northmont." His support began during his days as a student in the Randolph and Northmont School District and never wavered. He was a 1962 graduate of Northmont High School. He was an excellent basketball player and a member of several championship teams. After high school Morgan attended Ohio Northern University.

Morgan was Vice President of the J.S. Davis Company, a member of the Clayton United Methodist Church, and a member of the Downtown Dayton Partnership. He was very active in the Junior Achievement program and received the Spirit of American Enterprise Award in 1981. He also served on the Board of Trustees for Ohio Northern University.

He never lost his enthusiasm or interest in working with young people and education. Through the years he developed a lengthy resume of involvement in education. His contributions to the Northmont Schools were recognized when he was inducted into the Northmont Roll of Recognition in 1992. His plaque read, "Educational Advocate and Friend."


Morgan served on many committees within the school district. He was on the Roll of Recognition selection committee and had started a "History of Northmont" project. The "Northmont Athletic Hall of Fame" was one project, above all, that held his interest and his attention. Morgan felt very strongly that a Hall of Fame was needed to recognize all athletes and it needed to encompass the three districts that came together to form Northmont. He was an original member of the committee and provided valuable leadership to get the Athletic Hall of Fame established.

The Northmont Athletic Hall of Fame would not have come into being without the efforts of Morgan Davis. The athletes of the past, present, and future, have an opportunity to be recognized because Morgan had the vision to pursue what was fair and right for all.


CHARLIE FRY - ATHLETE

harlie Fry is a 1963 graduate of Northmont High School where he was a four-year starter and letter winner in football, basketball, and baseball. As a junior, Charlie garnered second team All-Southwestern Buckeye League accolades in football, and first team All-League and second team Journal Herald All-Star honors in basketball, averaging 18.5 points per game. Charlie's senior year saw his greatest athletic accomplishments. In football he was a first team All SWBL and Journal Herald All-Star. He repeated as a first team all-league performer in basketball, and also earned a first team selection to the Journal Herald and All-Southwest District All-Star teams. Charlie averaged 24.6 points per game, and still holds the record for the most points scored in a game, 53 points which helped him win the team's Most Valuable Player award for 1963. After his Northmont



career, he played basketball and baseball at Lincoln Memorial University, and eventually earned his Masters Degree from Miami University. Charlie is currently in his 38th year of teaching in the

Kettering School system.








Northmont as a coach in 1993, and became head soccer coach in 1995 posting a 130-63-28 record during his tenure. Mark has lead the Thunderbolt men's soccer program to nine conference and three district championships, along with three district runner-up trophies. Mark has been a sixtime conference coach of the year and a five-time All-Dayton North coach of the year.

GARY DILLHOFF - ATHLETE



ary Dilhoff played football and baseball during his career at Northmont High School, graduating in 1986. His greatest achievements came in baseball as a three-year letter winner at shortstop for Chuck Harlow's Thunderbolt teams. During his senior season, Gary earned All-GMVC, All-Area, and All-Ohio honors as a leadoff hitter with a .553 on base percentage. For his career, Gary left his mark on the Northmont baseball record book where he still stands #2 in home runs, #1 in base on balls for a season as a junior and #3 as a senior, #6 and #7 for stolen bases, #5 in hit by pitches, #1 in runs scored, and #4 in runs produced. As a two-year letter winner in football at free safety, Gary led the defensive backs in tackles and interceptions. He still has the second longest punt return in school history, a game-winning eighty-six yarder against Trotwood-Madison. After high

school, Gary played baseball at Sinclair, and eventually earned his B.S. degree from the University of Cincinnati. Gary still plays baseball in the Cincinnati over-30 league.




ori Davis-Clem helped lead the Northmont girls' soccer program to 83-6-3 and to three state championships during her four-year letter winning career which spanned from 1984-87, two of those teams posted undefeated records in 1985 and 1987. Lori was the area's leading scorer from 1985-87 scoring 102 career goals, which is still 25th all-time in Ohio. Lori earned All-GMVC and All-Southwest district honors in 1985, '86 and '87. She was first-team All-Ohio in 1986 and '87. Lori was also AAA player of the year, and All-America for her achievements during the 1987 season. Her accomplishments allowed her to win the Rae Burick female athlete of the year award for 1988. After her Northmont career in which we also saw her play softball, Lori continued her soccer career at the University of Dayton.

Northmont High School



In 1944 talk began about additional consolidation of schools. A plan was suggested for the school districts of Randolph, Clayton, Phillipsburg, and Brookville to join into one large district with a new complex of buildings to be constructed in a central location. Brookville voters rejected the consolidation concept. The voters of Phillipsburg, Clayton, and Randolph Districts approved the consolidation. The consolidation became a reality in 1957. The new Board of Education purchased a 55-acre farm at the corner of Crestway and National Road. A contest was held among all the school children to choose the new name of the consolidation. Patty Bowser won the contest with the name Northmont, a contraction of North Montgomery County. The students from each high school wanted to keep something from their schools in the process of consolidation. It was decided to use the Phillipsburg mascot of the Thunderbolts and the school colors of Randolph, kelly green and white. The transition was completed and Northmont High School opened in the school year 1959-1960.
