



Randolph High School was granted a charter by the State of Ohio in 1903. The first school building was in what is now known as the Tietzman building. Growth continued for Randolph schools and the Tietzman building could no longer accommodate the growing school population. In 1924 a new Randolph High School building was completed to take care of the growing number of students. The new Northmont High School opened in the fall of 1959, and the old Randolph High School became the new junior high school. The building is now the O.R. Edgington Elementary School.



Phillipsburg High School was organized in 1906 with classes held in the township hall. In 1919 land from Montgomery, Darke, and Miami counties became the Phillipsburg Consolidated School District. A new building was built and served Phillipsburg until the new Northmont High School opened in 1959. The existing building is now Phillipsburg Elementary School.



Established August 11, 2002

Being named to the Northmont Athletic Hall of Fame is the highest honor that can be awarded to former athletes, coaches, administrators, or boosters by the Northmont Athletic Department.

The purpose of the Hall of Fame is to honor individuals who have made lasting and significant contributions to the Northmont Athletic Department and perpetuated the spirit of pride and loyalty that is a cornerstone of the Northmont community.

Candidates' qualifications must possess the following criteria: 1) Student/Athletes of Phillipsburg, Randolph, or Northmont High Schools, 2) Nominees must have distinguished themselves as a member of the Northmont coaching staff, 3) nominees must have distinguished themselves in the area of administration, or 4) nominees are a dedicated fan of the Northmont athletic program. All candidates must have been out of school for at least 10 years.

The volunteer selection committee makes nominations and considers those received from alumni and the community. Members can nominate anyone from any era. Nominations must be submitted by March 1 of the preceding year. Nominations are researched and discussed, and a final list of candidates is then presented along with the detailed biography. Post high school athletic achievement, be it college, pro, or amateur, is not a consideration.

The committee sets no quotas by sex, sport, school, or era. Members are unbiased and fair-minded. Also, the committee is sworn to strict confidentiality of all discussions resulting from this process so as to protect the candidates and maintain the highest standard of integrity.

The Hall of Fame Committee accepts nominations at anytime. Nominators should provide as much detail as possible as to why they believe the candidate is worthy of induction. Nomination does not assure induction, only consideration. All nominations are archived and discussed with diligence. It is also recognized that a process such as this is not perfect. Given the number of schools, years, and candidates, it is possible a worthy candidate could be overlooked. This is why community and alumni nominations are highly encouraged.



organ was the quintessential "Friend of Northmont." His support began during his days as a student in the Randolph and Northmont School District and never wavered. He was a 1962 graduate of Northmont High School. He was an excellent basketball player and a member of several championship teams. After high school Morgan attended Ohio Northern University.

Morgan was Vice President of the J.S. Davis Company, a member of the Clayton United Methodist Church, and a member of the Downtown Dayton Partnership. He was very active in the Junior Achievement program and received the Spirit of American Enterprise Award in 1981. He also served on the Board of Trustees for Ohio Northern University.

He never lost his enthusiasm or interest in working with young people and education. Through the years he developed a lengthy resume of involvement in education. His contributions to the Northmont Schools were recognized when he was inducted into the Northmont Roll of Recognition in 1992. His plaque read, "Educational Advocate and Friend."

Morgan served on many committees within the school district. He was on the Roll of Recognition selection committee and had started a "History of Northmont" project. The "Northmont Athletic Hall of Fame" was one project, above all, that held his interest and his attention. Morgan felt very strongly that a Hall of Fame was needed to recognize all athletes and it needed to encompass the three districts that came together to form Northmont. He was an original member of the committee and provided valuable leadership to get the Athletic Hall of Fame established.

The Northmont Athletic Hall of Fame would not have come into being without the efforts of Morgan Davis. The athletes of the past, present, and future, have an opportunity to be recognized because Morgan had the vision to pursue what was fair and right for all.

CURT CONLEY - ATHLETE


urt Conley is a 1989 graduate of Northmont High School where he was a senior captain and three-sport varsity letter winner in football, basketball, and baseball. He set school records in football and baseball, some of which still stand today. In football, he was named to the All-GMVC Team both his junior and senior year while also being selected to play in the North South All-Star Football game. In baseball he posted a 4-2 record and batted .264 as a sophomore. His junior year he posted a 6-2 record, hit .315, and posted a no-hitter vs. Wayne striking out 18 of 21 batters and throwing two base runners out at first. Conley was named first team All-League and second team All-Ohio after posting a 16-6 career pitching record and helping Northmont win two league titles. He was voted Most Valuable Player in the All-Area 1989 baseball game. After his Northmont career, Conley



attended Ball State University and was selected the Most Valuable Pitcher his sophomore through senior year. He led the team in ERA, wins, strikeouts, innings pitched, starts and complete games. He was the first player in BSU history to be voted First Team All-Tournament after winning Ball State's first ever NCAA tournament game. He was drafted by the Colorado Rockies in the 26th round, finishing his professional career for Colorado's AA team. Conley returned to the Northmont area and gives back to the community by providing baseball instruction to youngsters. He is considered a fine instructor and outstanding mentor for our youth.



DOUG MANGEN - ATHLETE



oug Mangen, Class of 1983, was an outstanding linebacker for the Northmont High School football team, played guard for the basketball team, and third base for the baseball team. Mangen was a starting middle linebacker on the undefeated 1980 league championship football team. In 1981, he was named All-Conference linebacker, Journal Herald All-Star linebacker and was the third leading tackler in the league. Doug was the starting point guard on the 1981 basketball team earning him Honorable Mention All-League honors and Special Mention on the Dayton Daily News Coaches All Greater Dayton Team. Mangen was an All-League third baseman on the 1982 league championship team. In 1983, Mangen received the Argus-Sentinel Outstanding Senior Athlete Award. In his senior year he was a three-sport captain,

named coMVP, and earned Second Team All-League honors despite missing three games due to an injury. Mangen earned All-Southwest Ohio Class AAA and Special Mention All-Ohio finishing his career with 190 tackles, six sacks and a 35.8 yards punting average. Doug missed his entire senior basketball season recuperating from knee surgery. During his senior year in baseball, Doug hit .565, was named All-GMVC as a third baseman for the second straight year, and was named to the Miami Valley Baseball Coaches Association All-Area team. He was also named to the All-Ohio baseball team as an infielder. Mangen then played football at Ohio University and was a four year starter, a two-time Most Valuable Player, team captain, and amassed more than 400 career tackles. Doug was inducted into the Northmont Football Hall of Fame in 1998.

DARVIN L. MARSHALL - ATHLETE




Northmont High School. His sophomore year, he lettered in football, basketball, baseball and track. In football he played offense, defense, and on special teams. He played guard on the basketball team. In track he competed in the long jump, ran the 100-yard dash and was a member of the 4 x 200 and 4 x 800-yard relay teams. 'Red' participated in the 1963 state track finals, competing in the long jump. In baseball he was a pitcher and catcher, as well as playing all other infield positions. He holds two Northmont school records; the longest run from scrimmage, a 98-yard touchdown run, and the school long jump record of 21 feet, 3 inches. Marshall received the All-Around Athlete of the Year award in 1964, was selected by Lefty McFadden (sports director of WAVI radio) as a Star Football

Player of the Week, and also was named a "Wonder Bread" Player of the Week. Later, while stationed in Okinawa and serving in the U.S. Marine Corps, he continued to run track. Marshall returned home and after being elected Mayor of Phillipsburg, served on various subcommittees working with school administrators to further Northmont High School activities. Ritter Collett of the Dayton Daily News mentioned him in his bicentennial book titled, *Sports in Dayton*. Northmont's 1963 undefeated championship football team was noted for outscoring its opponents 383 to 64. That year, Marshall rushed for 692 yards, averaging 11.3 yards per carry.

GREG MENKE * - STUDENT ATHLETIC TRAINER

reg Menke was the first student athletic trainer in Northmont High School history, working from 1975 through 1978. While working under the direction of Northmont's first athletic trainer – Mr. Rick Dill, Greg attended three consecutive "Cramer" Summer Workshops hosted by Miami University earning him his student trainer's certificate. Greg was one of the first three student trainers. He worked with all sports for three years with his primary concentration being football, soccer, basketball and various spring sports. He did an excellent job in learning how to handle not only basic first aid treatment, but also in dealing with more extensive athletic related injuries and rehabilitation. Greg did a very good job in working with the athletes and also learned how to deal with the coaches and their particular needs. Greg was also instrumental



in helping design, set up and implement the training room at the high school. He spent a great deal of time in the organization and cleaning of that facility. He also learned how to care for the equipment and supplies that were used in the program. Greg was always present at all practices and contests and could be counted on to relay to the trainer and coaches any injuries or treatments that had been done. During his senior year, Greg took on more responsibilities by becoming a mentor for newer student trainers helping them 'learn the ropes' and figuring out what it took to be a Northmont Thunderbolt student trainer. Greg helped lay the foundation for a very successful athletic training program that continues to this day.

Northmont High School



In 1944 talk began about additional consolidation of schools. A plan was suggested for the school districts of Randolph, Clayton, Phillipsburg, and Brookville to join into one large district with a new complex of buildings to be constructed in a central location. Brookville voters rejected the consolidation concept. The voters of Phillipsburg, Clayton, and Randolph Districts approved the consolidation. The consolidation became a reality in 1957. The new Board of Education purchased a 55-acre farm at the corner of Crestway and National Road. A contest was held among all the school children to choose the new name of the consolidation. Patty Bowser won the contest with the name Northmont, a contraction of North Montgomery County. The students from each high school wanted to keep something from their schools in the process of consolidation. It was decided to use the Phillipsburg mascot of the Thunderbolts and the school colors of Randolph, kelly green and white. The transition was completed and Northmont High School opened in the school year 1959-1960.
